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



Favorite Foods Day is not only a menu planning and food preparation contest, it is also a wonderful day to meet other foods members, learn new nutrition information, and enjoy special activities. We will have some new, fun sessions!

This event is planned to give 4-H members the opportunity to show all the skills and information that have been learned in your 4-H Foods Project. Your leader will help guide you as you prepare for the event. If you have any questions, your leader or the 4-H Office can help you.

We hope that you enjoy yourself. Happy cooking!!!!

To Participate in Favorite Foods Day: You must be a 4-H member enrolled on a 4-H cooking or food-related project. You must enter the category appropriate to the year you just started in the cooking project.

Your dish must include at least 50% of your assigned ingredient. All members must include a recipe card for your dish.

Your will determine what you are cooking by what year you are currently enrolled in your food project. You must bring one place setting in which to serve your dish(es) for judging. Make enough of your dish(es) to serve as a potluck at the end of the day. If you use anything that may be an allergen, please indicate all ingredients on your recipe card.

1st **year Food Project** – You will be making a dish using fruits or vegetables. You MUST include a menu card for one meal which includes your dish.

2nd year Food Project – You will be making a grain dish with 4 or more ingredients. You MUST include a menu card for one meal which includes your dish.

3rd year Food Project – You will be making an appetizer (hors d'oeuvres) OR Dessert that must include 6 or more ingredients. You MUST include a menu card for one meal which includes your dish.

4th **year Food Project** – You will be making a dish using any kind of meat or bean. You MUST include a menu card for one meal which includes your dish.

5th year Food Project and above – You will be making a whole meal, containing three or more dishes (such as: Main dish, Side dish, Salad). Your meal needs to be balanced and designed around the ChooseMyPlate guidelines. Include recipe card for each of the dishes you prepare. You MUST include a menu card with a Whole Day of meals, including snacks.

Theme Setting Contest –This category can be entered by members of any year. It is an extra activity that you can take part in if you choose. This is a single place setting, tables will be provided. Match your place setting theme with the type of food you cooked.

Hints and Tips

Do not prepare candies or beverage-type foods as the Favorite Food.

Learn all you can about the favorite food you have chosen to prepare. The favorite food should be appropriate to your abilities and year in the foods project. You will be required to prepare a different food each year, depending on your years in the cooking project. You may NOT use any alcohol in your dish!

Learn as much as you can about the My Plate Dietary Guidelines for Americans. Check how your menu meets these guidelines.

Be sure to consider food color and texture when planning your menu. (ex: baked chicken, baked potatoes and cauliflower would not make an appealing meal.)

Do research (look up in different books or online) to get ideas for place settings and meal or menu planning.

Practice preparing your favorite food so you can tell others how to do it. Serve it to your family and friends. Get their comments. The 4-H motto is **"Learn by Doing".** And remember...practice makes perfect!

Please bookmark this site as it will be your go-to site to learn about YQCA, access help documents, purchase coupons, and earn your YQCA certification!

On the More Info/Parents & Youth page, you'll find help documents detailing the steps to getting your YQCA ILT certification, web-based training certification, and test-out certification. You'll notice a major change to the account structure – the opportunity to create a parent account and add children, essentially creating one family account for all your YQCA needs.

Parents/youth, if you have a current and valid YQCA certification, please follow <u>these steps</u> to get yourself set up on the new site. **Instructors**, if you have a current and valid YQCA certification, please use <u>this help document</u> to get yourself set up on the new system. Like we mentioned on last week's webinar, YQCA will be manually verifying all of these current and valid certifications, so please have patience! We have a full team of support staff ready to go and we will get your certification verified as quickly as possible. We will be working on instructor certifications first so they can start getting trainings set up on the new system.

If you have current and valid YQCA coupons, <u>here</u> are the steps to getting those exchanged. If you'd like to purchase coupons for the new site, use the "<u>Buy Coupons</u>" button in the top banner.

Remember, customer support will be provided M-F 10 AM – 6 PM CST. There is a chat feature and help button available. 4-H SHOOTING SPORTS – HUNTING PROJECT/ CALIFORNIA HUNTER EDUCATION COURSE

This project covers the information required to take the California hunter education test and obtain your hunter safety certificate. The hunter safety certificate allows you to purchase a hunting license or hunt in other states that require proof of having passed a hunter education course. The project is open to junior, intermediate, and senior 4-H members (no Cloverbuds). The six meetings will take place at the UC Cooperative Extension Office, 1031 S. Mt. Vernon Avenue, Bakersfield. Students should bring a writing utensil and paper to each class.

At the end of this course, each student is expected to demonstrate proper safety procedures with firearms and pass the written exam with a minimum passing score of 80% or better. Failure to pass the written exam prohibits the student from obtaining his/her hunter safety certificate, and she/he must retake the entire course. State law requires that each student attend every session. Missing one class session automatically drops the student from the course. Being tardy for class is also grounds for dropping a student.

Youth Loans

FACT SHEET August 2019

Overview

The U.S. Department of Agriculture's Farm Service Agency (FSA) makes operating loans of up to \$5,000 to eligible individual youths ages 10 to 20 to finance income-producing, agriculture-related projects. The project must be of modest size, educational, and initiated, developed, and carried out by youths participating in 4-H clubs, FFA, tribal youth organizations, or similar agricultural-affiliated groups.

The project must be an organized and supervised program of work. It must be planned and operated with the assistance of the organization advisor, produce sufficient income to repay the loan, and provide the youth with practical business and educational experience in agriculture-related skills.

Who May Borrow

To qualify for a loan, the applicant must:

- Comply with FSA's general eligibility requirements; and
- Conduct a modest income-producing project in a supervised program of work.



How Loan Funds May Be Used

These loans can finance many kinds of income-producing agricultural projects. The loan funds may be used to:

- · Buy livestock, seed, equipment, and supplies;
- · Buy, rent, or repair needed tools and equipment; and
- · Pay operating expenses for the project.

How It Works

To apply, the applicant must submit completed plans and budgets signed by the project advisor and parent or guardian along with the FSA application for loan assistance.

These loans:

- Have a maximum loan amount of \$5,000 (total principal balance owed at any one time cannot exceed this amount);
- Have an interest rate that is determined based on the cost of money to the federal government (after the loan is made, the interest rate for that loan will not change);
- Will be secured, in addition to promissory notes, by liens on the products produced for sale and on chattel property, including livestock, equipment, and fixtures purchased with loan funds; and
- Have a repayment schedule that varies depending on the type of project for which the loan is made. For example, if it involves raising livestock or crops, the loan is paid when the animals or produce are normally sold.

The following is a list of procedures and rules for participation in the 2022 State 4-H Shooting Sports Match.

 The registration process is as follows: All registration forms must be sent to the UCCE office of the county in which each participating 4-H club resides. Clubs can pay with 4-H club checks directly to the contest or payments can be made by County 4-H Councils/VMO's. Personal checks will not be accepted.

The county 4-H Youth Development Advisor, 4-H Program Community Education Specialist or other UCCE 4-H authorized individual shall sign the registration form to verify that all entrants, adults and youth, are currently enrolled in 4-H.

On or before the postmark date of March 15, 2022, the UCCE 4-H office personnel shall send the registration forms and payment to the Siskiyou County Leaders Council, 1655 South Main Street, Yreka, CA 96097.

- 2. After receiving and processing the registration packets from each county, labeled targets and skeet/trap score sheets will be mailed to the participating shooting sports leaders by April 15, 2022.
- 3. A California 4-H State certified Shooting Sports Leader must supervise all shooting (Leaders must be certified in the discipline of the category of the target being verified, i.e., leaders certified in Rifle may supervise rifle events, Shotgun leaders may supervise trap events, etc.). - 4. After scoring the returned targets, the results will be compiled and distributed through the UCCE offices. Ribbons, medals and trophies will be sent to the participating counties for the shooting sports leaders to distribute.

38th Annual State 4-H Shooting Sports Match

It's time to sharpen up your shooting skills and start preparing for the Thirty-Eighth Annual State 4-H Shooting Sports Match, sponsored by the Siskiyou County 4-H Council. Entries for the State 4-H Shooting Sports Match, must be postmarked by **March 15, 2022**. The rules are rather simple, and we will rely upon the guidance of leaders and advisors in order to avoid confusion and problems.

DIVISIONS (by age, as of December 31, 2021):

Junior: 9-10 years of age Intermediate: 11-13 years of age Advanced: 14-19 years of age Leader/Parent: parents and leaders currently enrolled in the 4-H program

ALL ENTRANTS MUST BE VERIFIED AS BEING CURRENTLY ENROLLED IN 4-H BY YOUR LOCAL UCCE OFFICE

CATEGORIES:

- Air rifle: (Air Rifle 3.6) The distance will be 10 meters (33 feet). The course of fire will be standing only. Ten shots will be fired on each target, one shot per bull's-eye. There will be four targets. The International Rifle Rules will be used. .177 caliber pellets only. AR-5/10 target.
- Sporter Air Rifle: (National Standard Three-Position Air Rifle Rules, pg. 12-13) The distance will be 10 meters (33 feet). Three positions: prone, standing, kneeling. For each position, ten shots will be fired on one target, one shot per bull's-eye. Shooting jackets are not permitted. Maximum of two sweatshirts may be worn. Shooting boots are not permitted. Any sights permitted (including telescopic). .177 caliber pellets only. AR-5/10 target. (To obtain copies of the rule book, contact: National Three-position Air Rifle Council / Camp Perry / P.O. Box 576 / Port Clinton, Ohio 43452 / email: compt@odcmp.com / phone 888.267.0796)
- Sporter Air Rifle (Prone Only): The distance will be 10 meters (33 feet). Ten shots will be fired on two targets, one shot per bull's-eye. Shooting jackets are not permitted. Maximum of two sweatshirts may be worn. Shooting boots are not permitted. Any sights permitted (including telescopic). .177 caliber pellets only. AR-5/10 target.
- 4. .22 Rifle Open Sights: (Light Rifle 3.3) Three positions: prone, standing, kneeling. For each position, five shots will be fired on each of 2 targets, one shot per bull's-eye. The distance will be 50 feet. One 1/4 inch aiming dot (any color) may be placed on target front, on each bull's-eye, for sighting purposes (dot centering not required). Slings may be used. The Smallbore Rifle Rules will be used. A-32 target.
- .22 Rifle Open Sights (Prone Only): (Light Rifle 3.3) Prone only: Five shots will be fired on each of 3 targets, one shot per bull's-eye. The distance will be 50 feet. One 1/4 inch aiming dot (any color) may be placed on target front, on each bull's-eye, for sighting purposes (dot centering not required). The Smallbore Rifle Rules will be used. A-32 target.
- .22 Rifle Iron Peep: (Light Rifle 3.3) Three positions: prone, standing, kneeling. For each position, ten shots will be fired on one target; one shot per bull's-eye. The distance will be 50 feet. Slings may be used. The Smallbore Rifle Rules will be used. A-17 target.

- .22 Rifle Telescope Sights: (Light Rifle 3.3) Three positions: prone, standing, kneeling. For each position, five shots will be fired on each of 2 targets; one shot per bull's-eye. The distance will be 50 feet. <u>Slings may not be used.</u> The Smallbore Rifle Rules will be used. A-32 target.
- .22 Rifle Telescope Sights (Prone Only): (Light Rifle 3.3) Prone only: Five shots will be fired on each of 3 targets, one shot per bull's-eye. The distance will be 50 feet. The Smallbore Rifle Rules will be used. A-32 target.
- .22 Competition Rifle: (Any Rifle 3.2) Three positions: prone, standing, kneeling. For each position, ten shots will be fired on one target, one shot per bull's eye. The distance will be 50 feet. Competition rifles may not have the sights changed to compete in other classes. Any sights may be used, including telescopic (sights: rule 3.7(a)). The Smallbore Rifle Rules will be used. A-36 target.
- 10. **.22 Hand Gun:** (.22 Caliber Pistol or Revolver 3.4) Ten shots will be fired on each target. There will be four targets. The distance will be 50 feet. All targets will be fired in the standing position. A 2-handed grip will be allowed in all divisions. The NRA Pistol Rules will be used. B-2 target.
- 11. American Skeet: Two rounds of skeet will be shot for a total of 50 targets. NSSA rules will apply. <u>http://www.nssa-nsca.org/wp-content/uploads/2012/03/2013-NSSA-Rule-Book.pdf</u> Scores shall be recorded on provided score sheet.
- 12. American Trap: Two rounds of singles (16 yard) trap will be shot for a total of 50 targets. The ATA Rule Book of the Amateur Trapshooting Association of America will be used. <u>http://www.shootata.com/Content/About The ATA/ATA Rule Book.aspx</u> Trap scores shall be recorded on provided score sheet.

AWARDS:

Each of the top 10% of shooters for each division within each category will receive a gold award, the next lower 10% a silver award, and the next lower 10% a bronze award. Percentage will be based on returned fired targets. Participation ribbons or awards will be awarded to all shooters who have returned fired targets.

Trophies Awarded to County Teams

The top three scorers of each county from the combined Junior, Intermediate and Advanced divisions within each category will be selected as the county team for that category. Within each category, there must be at least three teams for the trophy to be awarded. There will not be more than one team selected per county for each category. A county with fewer than three shooters in the combined Junior, Intermediate and Advanced divisions of a category will not have a team for that category.

Awards will be mailed to the participating UCCE office in mid-August for the leaders to pick up or for the county to distribute at the annual Achievement Night.

Scoring and firing will conform to the rule books of the National Rifle Association of America, except as otherwise specified. *Under no circumstances may any marks be made on fired target fronts other than by projectiles, except as specified for category 4 and 5. Marked or plugged targets will be disqualified.*

Due Date:

Fired targets must be postmarked to Siskiyou County UCCE Office, 1655 South Main Street, Yreka, CA 96097, no later than <u>June 13, 2022</u>. No late targets will be accepted.
