Grape growers to vote in May on state, district funding programs for GWSS, PD

Over the next three weeks, California grape growers will vote on two key measures, both of which propose funding for programs targeting vineyard pests and diseases like the glassy-winged sharpshooter and Pierce's Disease.

Kern County table-grape acreage owners are expected to receive ballots soon after May 6 to vote on a proposed assessment of \$8 per acre to fund a local table-grape pest and disease control district. The Kern County Board of Supervisors must first authorize the mailing, which it's expected to do at its May 3 meeting. The Clerk of the Board will then mail out ballots May 6.

Likewise, referendum ballots will be sent statewide to wine-grape growers during the week of May 16 to determine whether to continue the Pierce's Disease (PD) assessment.

Tulare County table-grape acreage owners also will vote this spring on an assessment level to fund activities for a local table-grape pest and disease control district. The district's board of directors, however, is still developing its ballot.

Districts' intentions. "The Districts' sole purpose is to protect the table-grape industry from glassy-winged sharpshooter, Pierce's disease and other new invasive pest species that constantly threaten our industry from abroad," board members of the Kern and Tulare pest districts note in a letter slated to be mailed to table-grape growers next week.

Since 2001, state and federal governments have spent more than \$135 million in Kern and Tulare Counties to combat GWSS and PD.

"Your new district is asking for only \$8 per acres, plus a maximum of a 2 percent annual increase at the discretion of your



district board of directors," the letter says. "Those funds will be used to augment, not replace, the current work funded by the government."

The Kern and Tulare table-grape districts plan to actively support the current area-wide GWSS monitoring and control programs. Among other strategies, the districts intend to provide education so all table-grape growers can recognize and test PD-infected vines for removal.

"The district has abatement authority, if needed, to ensure a more equitable and complete control," notes the letter. "In the past, the reaction to new invasive pests has been too little and too late. Now, there will be a mechanism in place to bring in state and federal government support to eradicate new invasive species.

"The district will develop aggressive eradication strategies for new pests and diseases which will almost certainly enter the Central Valley," the letter adds. "A rapid response to invasive threats (e.g. Medfly, Gilli mealybug) may well prevent their establishment. This is even more important if valley airports are opened up to international travel."

The letter concludes, "The government

programs have been an unqualified success, significantly reducing the GWSS/PD threat. However, if those programs were to disappear due to lack of grower interest and support, the very survival of the table grape industry will again be at risk.”

Wine-grape growers’ PD/GWSS assessment. For the statewide PD assessment, at least 40 percent of eligible wine-grape growers must cast ballots to validate the referendum. Passage requires either: a “yes” vote by 65 percent of those voting who represent the majority of the as-

essment that was paid in 2004; or a “yes” vote by a majority of those voting who represent 65 percent or more of the assessment that was paid in 2004.

PD/GWSS wine-grape assessments now fund more than 100 research projects. This year’s wine-grape assessment level was \$2 per \$1,000 of crop value.
