Opportunities To Receive Incentives For Adopting Conservation Practices

Are you interested in securing funding for your IPM program and other conservation practices? Check out the Environmental Quality Incentive Program (EQIP)!

What's the program?

The USDA's Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) offers incentive to help growers integrate conservation practices into their production, through the Environmental Quality Incentive Program (EQIP). This program covers many aspects, including promoting integrated pest management, encouraging soil and water conservation, and improving air quality. Adopting mating disruption for pest control, on-farm groundwater recharge, chipping vine materials upon vineyard removal, and the use of cover crop are examples of practices that are promoted and subsidized. Participating in EQIP is voluntary, and NRCS provides no-cost technical assistant to help growers implement conservation practices and meet program requirements.

Who is eligible?

All farmers and ranchers interested in increasing their sustainability practices related to IPM who own or rent agricultural land and make an income below the cut-off are eligible to apply. Please check with your local NRCS office to connect with your rep and discuss eligibility. All growers are encouraged to apply, but especially producers that are from <u>historically underserved communities</u>.

Where should I start?

What's the timeline and payout?

The deadline to submit <u>the application</u> for 2023 funding is **December 9^{th.}** All applications are then pooled into a selection for ranking by need in March, and contracts will be in obligation in early June. Payout will occur after the completion of one year of following the established guidelines for the program. Exact amounts have yet to be released, and so reach out to the local NRCS service center to find out more details.
