However, in light of Kern County's budgetary cutbacks and the current threat that the county's 4H programming will cease to exist, this article is instead an observation of the value and importance 4H provides in very young lives. Without question, 4H is an investment in youth development, ultimately benefiting all society.

Probably as most project groups, Golden Empire's Horse Project members vary in age, experience and background. Some of their commonalities include: their passion for horses, love of competition, ability to participate in and manage parliamentary procedure and public speaking, as well as the joyous simplicity of having fun. All that the program has to offer is obviously fueled by all things 'horse'. The project is a marvelous way to channel the passion for a greater good of self and society.

Alongside the love of horses, comes a love and respect for competing. The benefits of training and preparing for events are endless. Not only are skills honed, but the experience of caretaking and managing a 1200 pound animal commands discipline, flexibility and a great deal of patience. Preparing for an exhibition certainly entails a great amount of detailed planning; actual execution at a show demands respect, self-confidence, patience and support of other riders. Both good and poor performances foster good sportsmanship. Opportunities for learning and developing are, as stated before, absolutely endless.

Regarding meeting practices, 4H meetings present opportunities to learn about parliamentary procedure and to actually participate in business meetings. Children ranging in age from nine to 18 not only attend, but serve as officers, facilitate procedure, vote and are encouraged to take part in discussion. Besides scouting and student government,

seemingly there are not many other opportunities to experience these lifelong skills at such a young age. Hand in hand with the meeting experience, comes public speaking exposure. From the simplest exercise of making a verbal motion, to taking minutes and reading them aloud, to presenting ideas and facilitating discussion, these acts are lifelong skills that not only hone public speaking, but build self-confidence and independence.

Perhaps some Horse Project members will not recognize the full benefits of being part of 4H until adulthood. But without question, the members enjoy what they do and simply enjoy the fun. With this said, the concept of fun should not be shortchanged. Fun for something has the potential to manifest into lifelong passions and benefit the greater good. Thus, returning to the original question the Golden Empire Horse Project members were asked, "What is the very best part of the Golden Empire Horse Project?" their answers succinctly capture all of these observations.

Cavies are coming to the 2010 Kern County Fair!

What is a Cavy? Cavy is a fancy show word for "Guinea Pig." This year, the Kern County Fair is offering cavies as a new division of small animal exhibition. Cavies will be under the rabbit committee, since cavies are also governed by the American Rabbit Breeders Association. Cavies are inexpensive to raise, require minimal space, and are a great animal project for 4-H members that don't have the resources or physical ability, space, or proper zoning to handle larger animal projects.

This new category has the potential to allow members who live in an apartment to have a breeding and/or showmanship project, without having to find a place for their animal to be housed. This will also be of benefit for those members experiencing strict zoning issues.

There are 13 recognized breeds of cavies in the United States. Cavies will have two breed divisions (Americans and All Other Breeds) this year, and more may be added for future fairs, depending on entries from the previous year/s. There will be BOB & BOS Awards, Best In Show and Reserve In Show Awards, Cavy Showmanship classes AND cavies will be eligible to go through the auction! That's right, you can sell your cavy to help fund your project! ☺

4-H Hat Etiquette

What you may put on your cap



Left Side

Place the Bronze, Silver, Gold, or All-Star 2" from the front. Only the current Star Rank held may

be worn.

Place the Junior or Teen Leader emblem behind the star. This is worn only while the member is serving as a Junior or Teen Leader.

Fasten the All-Star pin to the center of the All-Star emblem.

Right Side

Place a year pin and stripe for each completed 4-H year behind the 4-H emblem, with the first year next to the 4-H Clover.

Junior members wear a white stripe on a green background. Senior members wear a green stripe on a white background. Junior Leaders use a gold stripe on a green background and Teen Leaders use a gold stripe on a white background.

Medals received in the California Incentives and Awards Program may be worn on either side of the cap. No other pins or ribbons are to be worn on the cap at any time. The 4-H cap should reflect the dignity of the 4-H Youth Development Program and not be cheapened by fastening to it every emblem, award, and ribbon won by the member. Some items not to be worn on the hat include buttons, fair medals, or all three stars at the same time.

Which, When, and Where?

Wearing a 4-H cap is not a requirement for membership. If a member chooses to wear a cap the following guidelines should be observed.

Green or White?

Junior members wear the green cap. A junior member is anyone in the 8th grade or below. Senior members wear the white cap. A senior member is anyone in 9th grade and above.

When to Wear?

Girls may wear the 4-H cap anywhere girls usually wear hats -- 4-H meetings, events, public gatherings and in church.

Boys do not wear the cap in church, at meals or at memorial services, indoors or outdoors, unless they are serving as color guards. Boys serving as color guards wear their caps until the flags are placed and they are seated. When saluting the American flag, remove your cap and hold in your right hand, over your heart.

Where to Get?

Obtain 4-H caps from the local club leader who purchases them from Leslie Carman. The manufacturer sews the 4-H emblem on the right side of the cap. For information on obtaining a cap, scarf, or tie locally, contact the Extension Office at 661-868-6233.
