4-H Hat Etiquette

What you may put on your cap



Left Side

Place the Bronze, Silver, Gold, or All-Star 2" from the front. Only the current Star Rank held may be worn.

Place the Junior or Teen Leader emblem behind the star. This is worn only while the member is serving as a Junior or Teen Leader.

Fasten the All-Star pin to the center of the All-Star emblem.

Right Side

Place a year pin and stripe for each completed 4-H year behind the 4-H emblem, with the first year next to the 4-H Clover.

Junior members wear a white stripe on a green background. Senior members wear a green stripe on a white background. Junior Leaders use a gold stripe on a green background and Teen Leaders use a gold stripe on a white background.

Medals received in the California Incentives and Awards Program may be worn on either side of the cap. No other pins or ribbons are to be worn on the cap at any time. The 4-H cap should reflect the dignity of the 4-H Youth Development Program and not be cheapened by fastening to it every emblem, award, and ribbon won by the member. Some items not to be worn on the hat include buttons, fair medals, or all three stars at the same time.

Which, When, and Where?

Wearing a 4-H cap is not a requirement for membership. If a member chooses to wear a cap the following guidelines should be observed.

Green or White?

Junior members wear the green cap. A junior member is anyone in the 8th grade or below. Senior members wear the white cap. A senior member is anyone in 9th grade and above.

When to Wear?

Girls may wear the 4-H cap anywhere girls usually wear hats -- 4-H meetings, events, public gatherings and in church.

Boys do not wear the cap in church, at meals or at memorial services, indoors or outdoors, unless they are serving as color guards. Boys serving as color guards wear their caps until the flags are placed and they are seated. When saluting the American flag, remove your cap and hold in your right hand, over your heart.

Where to Get?

Obtain 4-H caps from the local club leader who purchases them from Leslie Carman. The manufacturer sews the 4-H emblem on the right side of the cap. For information on obtaining a cap, scarf, or tie locally, contact the Extension Office at 661-868-6233.

4-H Policy at a Glance

The *University of California Cooperative Extension 4-H Youth Development Program Policy Handbook* contains all the rules and guidelines that administer the 4-H program. The handbook uses the term “unit” instead of club. The handbook can be accessed online at: <http://www.ca4h.org/Administration/Policies/> An item from the handbook will occasionally be included in the 4-H newsletter to keep members, leaders, and parents informed of current policies. The policy item will be posted first as a question for you to test your knowledge. The correct answer and where it is located in the policy manual will then be included for your convenience.

Question: Are 4-H meetings open to the public as specified in the Brown Act?

Answer: No. The Ralph M. Brown Act (“Brown Act”) enacted in 1953, applies solely to California’s city and county government agencies, boards, and councils. California 4-H Youth Development Program meetings are not open to the public and are not subject to the Brown Act. The only exception would be a meeting/activity to which the public was expressly invited, such as a membership drive. This information was taken from Chapter 8: 4-H Council/Unit Management, Section VII. Brown Act and 4-H Unit/Council Meetings.

4-H National Youth Science Day

The third annual **4-H National Youth Science Day** will be held nationally on Wednesday, October 6, 2010. Created to combat a shortage of American young people pursuing science college majors and careers, 4-H National Youth Science Day seeks to spark an early youth interest and leadership in science.

Evaluation Program
Clues All Around Us**

CAL WHEP stands for Wildlife Habitat Evaluation Program, the California focused program based on a national 4-H program created to teach participants about wildlife ecology and management. WHEP activities in “*Clues all Around Us*” are designed to operate in the traditional 4-H camp program system, but could be adapted for any youth group format, formal or non-formal settings.

4-H WHEP teaches participants the concepts of fish and wildlife management, about wildlife food, cover, space, other habitat requirements and how they differ from one animal to another. Other concepts that are covered include; plant succession, migration, carrying capacity, aquatic dynamics, food webs, and data collecting. Participants learn how to make a hike more intense with observation and discovery techniques, inquiry procedures, and detective-type methods.

California 4-H WHEP fosters relationships and partnerships among professional wildlife and fisheries biologists, volunteers, parents, teachers, landowners, and youth. Participants in WHEP develop and practice essential life skills such as oral and written communication, decision making, service learning, leadership, and problem solving. It helps youth strengthen their self-concept and character through these interactions.

This training will showcase the WHEP Camp Curriculum developed by the California 4-H WHEP Advisory team. This curriculum focuses on California species and habitats and can be used in any area of the state. California 4-H WHEP curriculum engages participants with experiential activities designed for primaries (5 – 8 years old), juniors (9 – 13 years old), seniors (14 – 18 years old).
